#136 - Russia Heads South -

With red stars looking magnificent on their silver wings, dozens of Russia's strategic bombers leisurely hover over the now Russian-occupied Crimean Peninsula. "Nobody expected Russia to take military actions." The EU ministerial meeting held in March was gloomy. We're now facing the New Cold War. In April, the US revealed their plan to send ground troops to Poland as a measure to strengthen collective defense. They're also considering sending them to Baltic countries in the future. The US Secretary of Defense, Chuck Hagel, warned NATO members by saying, "Russia's actions shutter that myth (that the end of the Cold War has eased the risk of conflict among nations) and usher in bracing new realities."

As you may recall, Russia spent roughly fifty billion dollars, the highest cost in the Olympic history, on the Sochi Olympics and mobilized 70,000 troops, twice the number of troops in the London Olympics, to keep terrorists at bay.
