There are very few schools in Japan where you can study mining. As far as I know, Akita University is the only one with mining engineering department. However, elsewhere in the world, many people with degree in mining are working as oil and gas field supervisors, and quite a few of them make over one hundred thousand dollars annually. In the U.S. where the shale revolution is taking place, Williston, North Dakota and Houston, Texas are the two hottest cities that are booming thanks to shale gas. Williston is known for recording the all-time lowest unemployment rate in the country. Houston, known as the center of American oil production, is now leading the production of a non-conventional resource, "shale gas." As they drill new shale formations one after another, the economy has boomed so much that the rent for their local office building quickly doubled. Also, Houston already has pipelines laid out for them and there's no need for extra equipment investment. That's why many investors are flocking to the city. As a result, the price for concession is skyrocketing, causing a bubble economy.

However, the biggest contributing factor to the bubble is the system that bring enormous wealth to landowners. Greedy landlords, mining companies, and oil majors are working together for their own benefits, accelerating the bubble economy.
